#### **DCEO Celebrates 2023 Black Business Month** *Proudly Celebrating the Contributions of Black Businesses in Illinois*

The Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (DCEO) launched its annual Black Business Month campaign – developed to celebrate and support Black-owned businesses and entrepreneurs across Illinois. This monthlong celebration includes a webinar highlighting community leaders, organizations, and business enterprises throughout the state, stops on the Statewide Black Business Survey Roadshow, a campaign inviting Illinoisans to “Shop Black-owned Business Saturdays,” as well as company highlights via social media. Throughout Black Business Month, DCEO is honoring the 141,000 Black-owned businesses that employ more than 175,000 people across Illinois, generating \$8 billion in economic activity annually. Promoting and supporting Black-owned businesses through Black Business Month is an important step in addressing the racial wealth gap that continues to persist in the United States.

## Innovate Illinois Calls for whitepapers around the EDA's Distress Areas Recompete Pilot Program

The US federal government has dedicated an unprecedented level of investment to catalyze more inclusive and sustainable regional economies. For a number of these opportunities coming down the pipeline, Illinois has strong leadership, expertise, and a competitive advantage – these funding opportunities could significantly benefit our state and transform our economy. But we need to be prepared to aggressively compete for these federal dollars. To seize these opportunities, leaders from across the state have come together to form [Innovate Illinois](#), a coordinated, robust operating model that aims to establish Illinois as a leader in key long-term technology clusters.

This is expected to be a highly competitive application and a critical chance to bring jobs to places that need them the most and ensure that communities have a path to economic prosperity. **To ensure that there is a coordinated approach for Recompete Pilot Program bids around the state, Innovate Illinois seeks to understand interest and identify the most promising applications. We will select proposals and provide them with enhanced state support and other resources in the proposal development process.**

To facilitate this process, Innovate Illinois invites you to submit a short ~2-page whitepaper to have your Recompete bid be considered for state support and other resources. The paper should outline your proposal with documentation about how it aligns with the points and review criteria in the federal NOFO, and how it will be transformational for the region. The Office of Minority Economic Empowerment (OMEE) Business Development Managers invite you to an online conversation that's open to all minorities ((racial/ethnic), women, persons with disabilities, veterans, and LGBTQIA+) and any other marginalized groups-owned businesses. Team OMEE will provide you with the latest updates on financial resources like federal and state programs, information about other opportunities, and answer any questions you may have about your business. We'll take questions in English and Spanish.

## Illinois Works Pre-Apprenticeship Program

DCEO has launched \$10 million in funding for the third round of the Illinois Works Pre-Apprenticeship Program. The Illinois Works Pre-Apprenticeship Program provides training opportunities, expands the talent pipeline, and boosts diversity in the construction industry and building trades. Grantees will be selected through a competitive Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) process.

The latest round of funding will focus on awarding grants in geographic areas without pre-apprenticeship programs, while increasing the representation of underrepresented groups that are not served or are underserved by existing programs, including Asian Americans, veterans, and women.

Through Illinois Works, DCEO is expanding its statewide network of providers to recruit, prescreen, and provide pre-apprenticeship skills training. The program providers offer structured pathways and manage the program graduates' transition from the pre-apprenticeship program to a full apprenticeship program in construction and building trades. Participants of the program attend tuition-free and receive a stipend and other supportive, barrier reduction services to help enter the construction industry. Upon completion of the program, pre-apprentices receive industry aligned certifications which will prepare and qualify them to continue to a registered apprenticeship program in one of the trades.

Applications are open to all [Economic Development Regions](#), with a focus on expanding capacity in the following areas:

- Central Region (Region 1) – Sangamon County
- North Central Region (Region 3) – Peoria County, McClean County
- Northeast Region (Region 4) – DeKalb County, DuPage County, Kane County, Kankakee County, Kendall County, McHenry County, Suburban Cook County, Will County
- Northwest Region (Region 6) – LaSalle County, Rock Island County, Whiteside County
- Southeast Region (Region 7) – Marion County, Lawrence County
- Southern Region (Region 8) – Jackson County

Eligible applicants include non-profit, community-based organizations, such as industry associations, chambers of commerce, local workforce areas, community colleges, technical schools, and school districts. Experienced and new providers are encouraged to apply, along with existing Illinois Works grantees who propose to serve a

different geographic area or Economic Development Region than they were originally contracted to serve. Applicants serving priority Economic Development Regions and underrepresented populations as outlined in the NOFO will be granted extra points during the merit review process.

Qualified entities can apply for grants between \$55,000 to \$550,000. Applications will be accepted until **August 30, 2023, at 5:00 p.m.** To view the NOFO and apply for the grant, please visit the [DCEO website](#). ## **Business Resiliency Grant Program**

The Business Resiliency grant opportunity, funded through the U.S Department of Housing and Urban Development's Community Development Block Grant-Coronavirus (CDBG-CV), is now available for County Leads to begin preparing applications. More than \$24 million has been allocated to reimburse eligible businesses for expenses to prevent, prepare for or respond to COVID-19, specifically for activities undertaken to keep them in business during the pandemic. Some examples include tent rental for customers to dine outside, plexiglass partitions between staff and customers, and cashless payment systems. Businesses are eligible for up to \$20,000 and must apply as part of an application from a Lead Local Government within the County. Individual applications from businesses cannot be accepted.

## **Climate and Equitable Jobs Act (CEJA)**

### **CEJA CLEAN JOBS WORKFORCE NETWORK PROGRAM**

The [Clean Jobs Workforce Network Program](#) creates 13 regional Clean Jobs Workforce Hubs ("Workforce Hubs") throughout the State to provide clean energy and related workforce and training opportunities to participants. The program will serve people living in equity eligible communities, as well as people who experience barriers to employment. Community-based organizations that provide employment, skill development or related services, and that have demonstrated relationships with residents and organizations serving the community are invited to apply.

Through a competitive Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO), qualified entities can apply for grants, with awards ranging from \$1 million to \$5 million (inclusive of CEJA Workforce Hubs and Barrier Reduction Program funding). Applications will be accepted until **September 1, 2023, at 5:00 p.m.** To view the NOFO and apply for the grant, please visit the [DCEO website](#). ### **CLIMATE AND EQUITABLE JOBS ACT (CEJA) WORKFORCE AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT WEBINAR**

Starting August 10th at 11am, the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity will be hosting a series of interactive webinars to engage all potential CEJA grantees. CEJA will be most successful when qualified grantee organizations with experience and strong relationships in the target communities collaborate to provide comprehensive recruitment, training, wraparound support, job placement services and business capacity building. The purpose of this webinar series is to highlight the contractors/economic development CEJA programs and

encourage businesses, training institutions, and community-based organizations to meet and consider partnering on CEJA grant applications. ## **Federal Grant Support Program**

The Department's Federal Grant Support Program will make up to \$15 million available to Illinois based businesses and organizations seeking competitive federal grants. Competitive federal grants typically require a match, which is the non-federal share of the project costs that a grantee must contribute to achieve the purposes

of the award. In some instances where there is no formal matching requirement, the percentage of the match provided by the grantee is used as a metric for evaluating the competitiveness of an application. The Department may provide a grant up to \$2,000,000 that entails up to a 1:1 match of the applicant's cash contribution towards the project. This matching grant program is intended to encourage more Illinois-based applicants to apply for federal grant opportunities, provide critical assistance to meet the minimum match eligibility requirements, increase the competitiveness of applications, and provide the State of Illinois with an opportunity to make a firm commitment and demonstration of support for projects that are well aligned with the State's economic development goals and priorities. Eligible applicants will apply for this program while they are preparing an application for a federal grant. Successful applicants will then receive a letter of commitment that they will be awarded a Federal Grant Support grant from the Department, contingent on receiving a federal award.

### **Connect Illinois Round 3 Open & Accepting Applications**

Through multiple rounds of competitive matching grants, Connect Illinois seeks to achieve what no other state or federal approach to date has accomplished: ubiquitous broadband access for homes, businesses, and community anchor institutions.

Applications should be classified under one of three categories: (a) Broadband Access for Illinois homes, businesses, and community anchor institutions in unserved or underserved areas; (b) Broadband Innovation for economic development and related applications; or (c) Urban Broadband for expanded access and/or innovation in qualified Illinois cities or metropolitan areas of 75,000 residents or more.

All Connect Illinois projects must include infrastructure expansion scalable to speeds of at least 100 Mbps download and 100 Mbps upload upon deployment.

For Broadband Access projects, proposals covering unserved and/or underserved areas are eligible for Connect Illinois grant funding via this NOFO. An unserved area is an area of Illinois in which households, businesses, or community anchor institutions lack access to wireline broadband service of at least 25/3 Mbps. An underserved area is an area of Illinois in which households, businesses, or community anchor institutions have wireline broadband access of at least 25/3 Mbps but less than 100/20 Mbps

#### **HUD Hope VI Main Street Grant Program Funding for Affordable Housing on Main Streets Informational Webinar Thursday, September 7, 2023 2:00 PM in Central Time (US and Canada)**

The creation of affordable downtown rental units fills an urgent need for small and rural communities. New residential Main Street development strengthens small businesses, bolsters the local economy, and renews vibrancy. The HOPE VI Main Street Grant Program through the Department of Housing and Urban Development

(HUD) provides grants to communities with populations smaller than 50,000 to assist in the renovation of a historic traditional central business district, or “Main Street”. The Main Street grant enables revitalization through replacing unused obsolete commercial space with affordable housing units. Join this webinar on the program to learn about the application process, address questions related to the current NOFO, and learn how you can take action to promote housing in your Main Street district. ## Illinois EPA Announces Six Fall 2023 Household Hazardous Waste Collection Events

Illinois EPA Director John J. Kim is announcing six upcoming Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) one-day collection locations for the Fall of 2023. These collection events are co-sponsored by units of local government and provide residents the free opportunity to safely dispose of unused or leftover hazardous products commonly found in homes.

One-day collections are open to all Illinois residents and operate from 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. on the day of the event. Pre-registration is required for all Fall 2023 collection events. Residents participating are encouraged to bring chemical cleaners, oil-based paints, thinners, antifreeze, motor oil, gasoline, kerosene, weed killers, insecticides, and pesticides, old or outdated medication, and similar hazardous household products. Fluorescent and other high-intensity discharge lamps may also be brought to the collections. **ITEMS NOT ACCEPTED include latex paint, explosives, propane tanks, fire extinguishers, smoke detectors, agricultural chemicals, and business wastes.**

### For safe transport of HHW, residents are asked to:

- Pack HHW items in a disposable box to avoid spilling during transport.
- Keep like chemicals together and separate unlike chemicals.
- Secure lids and make sure containers are not leaking.
- Place box(es) of HHW in the empty trunk or storage compartment of your vehicle, away from passengers during transport.
- **Remain in vehicle at collection site.** On-site personnel will remove the HHW from your vehicle.

## Illinois EPA Electric Vehicle Rebate Program Funding

The Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (Illinois EPA) is announcing that the next funding round for Illinois' Electric Vehicle (EV) Rebate Program **will open Wednesday, November 1, 2023 and run through Wednesday, January 31, 2024**. Individuals that purchase a new or used all-electric vehicle from an Illinois licensed dealer, meet all other eligibility requirements, and apply during the rebate cycle will be eligible for a rebate as long as funds are available. Forms and instructions on submitting a rebate application will be made available on the [Electric Vehicle Rebate Program webpage](#) on **October 18, 2023**.

EV purchasers must apply for a rebate within 90 days of the vehicle purchase date. However, applications will not be accepted or reviewed if submitted or postmarked prior to the November 1, 2023 rebate cycle start date. Payments will be made to eligible individuals as long as funding is available.

The Illinois General Assembly has appropriated \$12 million to Illinois EPA for the current fiscal year, which ends on June 30, 2024. Actual funding amounts will be determined by the amount of money available in the Electric Vehicle Rebate Fund, not to exceed \$12 million.

Generally, to be eligible for a rebate, the vehicle must be exclusively powered and refueled by electricity, plugged in to charge, and licensed to drive on public roadways. Electric mopeds, electric off-highway vehicles, hybrid electric or extended-range electric vehicles that are also equipped with conventional fueled propulsion or auxiliary engines are not eligible under the program. Eligibility requirements for an EV rebate in Illinois are set forth in the Illinois EPA's regulations at 35 Ill. Adm. Code 275. These requirements include, but are not limited to:

- The purchaser must reside in Illinois at time of vehicle purchase and at the time the rebate is issued.
- An applicant may not previously have received an Electric Vehicle Rebate..
- The vehicle must be purchased from a dealer licensed by the Illinois Secretary of State.
- Rented or leased vehicles do not qualify for the rebate.
- Vehicles purchased from an out-of-state dealership, and vehicles delivered to or received by the purchaser out-of-state are not eligible for a rebate.
- The purchaser must apply for the rebate within 90-days after the vehicle purchase date.
- The purchaser must retain ownership of the vehicle for a minimum of 12 consecutive months immediately after the vehicle purchase date.
- The rebate amount cannot exceed the purchase price of the vehicle.
- Documentation requirements include a copy of purchase invoice, proof of purchase, vehicle registration, and IRS W-9 or W-8 forms.

The Illinois' [Electric Vehicle Rebate Program webpage](#) includes a Frequently Asked Questions document, and other relevant information. Please note, **a new EV Rebate Application form will be posted to the webpage on October 18, 2023, along with instructions for completing the application.**

The Illinois EV Rebate Program was created under the Climate and Equitable Jobs Act (CEJA) passed by the General Assembly and signed by Governor Pritzker in the fall of 2021. As required under CEJA, Illinois EPA will prioritize the review of applications from low-income purchasers and award rebates accordingly. Low income is defined as persons and families whose income does not exceed 80 percent of the State median income, as established by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. All other applications will be processed as received on a first come, first serve basis.

### **IDPH Mental Health Services in Schools Grant**

Governor JB Pritzker and the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) announced the State of Illinois is accepting grant applications from schools and agencies that support child and adolescent health for a share of \$10 million in federal funding intended to strengthen mental health services for students across Illinois. The funding from the CDC's COVID-19 Public Health Workforce Supplemental Funding program is being offered to help schools and local agencies improve student care in areas such as workforce enhancements, developing frameworks to prevent adverse childhood experiences, interventions to assist children suffering from trauma, and training for medical and school staff to expand adolescent mental health resources. The funding is authorized by the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA) and the application process is being administered by IDPH's Office of Women's Health & Family Services. Following are the two program areas in which funds will be allocated:

- **\$6.9 million for Enhancing Post-Covid Recovery Efforts for School Based Health Needs:** Up to \$500,000 per school district or qualifying school affiliated organization to expand workforces, purchase mental health training materials and deploy programs and resources to enhance student mental health. (Up to 25 grants expected.)
- **\$3 million for Preventing Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) Post-COVID-19:** To identify mental health issues within school populations and provide education, resources, care coordination, and or training that helps to develop frameworks to prevent adverse childhood experiences and improve mental health outcomes for children and youth in a post-pandemic world. (Up to 15 grants expected.)

**IDPH will be accepting applications from school districts and agencies that support adolescent mental health through September 8.** Grant applications will be handled through IDPH's [Electronic Grants Administration & Management System \(EGRAMS\)](#) system.

### **IEPA Green Infrastructure Grant**

Illinois Environmental Protection Agency Director John J. Kim announced a grant opportunity with \$10 million in funding for projects that will improve water quality in Illinois. The Green Infrastructure Grant Opportunities (GIGO) Program has been made possible by Governor Pritzker's bipartisan Rebuild Illinois capital plan. The Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) is posted at <https://il.amplifund.com/Public/Opportunities/Details/8eb59a23-1ba2-4930-acf3-2622dbb7e364>.

The GIGO Program provides funding for projects to construct green infrastructure best management practices (BMPs) that prevent, eliminate, or reduce water quality impairments by decreasing stormwater runoff into Illinois' rivers, streams, and lakes. Projects that implement treatment trains (multiple BMPs in series) and/or multiple BMPs within the same watershed may be more effective and efficient than a single large green infrastructure BMP.

For GIGO, green infrastructure means any stormwater management technique or practice employed with the primary goal to preserve, restore, mimic, or enhance natural hydrology. Green infrastructure includes, but is not limited to, methods of using soil and vegetation to promote soil percolation, evapotranspiration, and filtering or the harvesting and reuse of precipitation. Examples of project types/BMPs that may be funded through GIGO are provided in the NOFO. Illinois EPA anticipates project awards between \$75,000 and \$2.5 million. The first \$5 Million in GIGO grants were awarded to eleven grantees in 2021 and 2022. Four projects have completed construction and the remaining are under construction.

## **IDNR Open Space Land Acquisition and Development Grant Land and Water Conservation Fund Grant**

The Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) announced applications are being accepted for grants through the Open Space Land Acquisition and Development (OSLAD) and the federal Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) grant programs.

The OSLAD program is a state-financed grant program that provides funding assistance to local government agencies for acquisition and/or development of land for public outdoor recreation areas. OSLAD is a matching program that provides an advance payment (for development projects only) that is 50 percent of the grant award amount shortly after the grant agreement is executed.

The LWCF is a program that utilizes federal funds to acquire land to be used for outdoor recreation. The LWCF program provides up to 50 percent of the certified market value of property acquired to be developed into outdoor recreation areas.

The application period for both programs opened July 3, 2023 and applications must be submitted to the IDNR **by 5:00 p.m. August 31, 2023**. ## **IDOT Safe Routes to School Program**

With students soon to be trading swim bags for backpacks, the Illinois Department of Transportation announced that applications for the Safe Routes to School program are now being accepted. The program helps to support projects that make walking, biking and rolling to school a safe option for students as part of a commitment by IDOT and Gov. JB Pritzker to expand active transportation throughout the state.

Administered by IDOT using federal funds, Safe Routes to School advances projects that improve safety and reduce traffic in areas around schools, grades kindergarten through high school. The new grant cycle will distribute a total of \$6 million, with a maximum award of \$250,000. Projects may include new sidewalks, traffic-calming measures and improvements that increase accessibility for those with disabilities.

Successful applications will demonstrate how the projects encourage students to walk, bike or roll. Eligible applicants include school districts, local governments, planning organizations and nonprofit associations. Preference will be given to schools with higher percentages of low-income students and students with disabilities.

### **IHDA “Opening Doors” Homebuyer Assistance Program**

Governor JB Pritzker announced the reopening of a homeownership program designed to help working-class families and underrepresented communities of color throughout the state of Illinois. Offered through the Illinois Housing Development Authority (IHDA), the **Opening Doors** or **Abriendo Puertas** program is designed to aid households who have historically faced steeper barriers in their path toward homeownership with \$6,000 in forgivable assistance for down payment and/or closing costs. This latest round of assistance is funded through \$20 million in Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds authorized by the American Rescue Plan Act and appropriated to IHDA from the Illinois General Assembly. IHDA expects to assist more than 3,000 homebuyers.

Opening Doors is intentionally designed to address specific barriers commonly faced by underserved populations and households of color when applying for a mortgage and buying a home. IHDA will provide a 30-year 1st mortgage with a competitive fixed interest rate and \$6,000 in down payment and/or closing cost assistance. The down payment assistance is forgiven on a monthly basis over a five-year forgiveness period, and no monthly payment is due from the borrower. Borrowers must meet all eligibility requirements established for IHDA’s down payment assistance programs, and homebuyer education is required. Opening Doors is available to both first-time and repeat buyers, may be used by buyers in any county in the state, and can be used in conjunction with other down payment assistance programs to increase homebuyer leverage.

All IHDA mortgage programs offer safe and reliable down payment assistance to both first-time and repeat homebuyers in any county of the state. All mortgage products are subject to income and purchase price limits. Eligibility for each product is based on the borrower’s credit profile, household income and the purchase price of the home.

### **IDES Workshare Illinois**

WorkShare IL is a voluntary program that provides employers facing a decline in business with an alternative to layoffs. The program allows an employer to reduce the number of hours worked in any unit of their business in order to avoid permanent layoffs. Each employee in an affected unit continues to work but experiences a reduction in hours that ranges from 20% to 60%. Employees receive a corresponding percentage of unemployment benefits during the period of temporary reduction to offset the reduction in earnings.

#### **WorkShare IL Benefits Employers and Employees**

##### **Employer Benefits:**

- Employers maintain a trained workforce during temporary periods of business downturn.
- Employers avoid turnover costs associated with hiring and training new employees.
- Minimizes significant increases to employers' Unemployment Insurance costs.

#### Employee Benefits:

- Employees keep their job and avoid a temporary or permanent layoff.
- Employees receive weekly unemployment benefits to offset the partial loss in earnings.

- Employees are not required to conduct ongoing job searches.

### Illinois EPA Electric School Buses

Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (Illinois EPA) Director John J. Kim announced a \$27,023,485 Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) to fund the replacement of existing diesel school buses with new all-electric school buses located and operated in any of the three priority areas outlined in the Beneficiary Mitigation Plan (BMP). Illinois EPA will also fund a portion of new electric charging equipment if charging infrastructure is needed. This opportunity continues the Pritzker Administration's commitment to focus Illinois' remaining Volkswagen (VW) Settlement funding on electric transportation and infrastructure.

Through this funding opportunity, Illinois EPA intends to fund projects in the three priority areas outlined in the VW BMP and specified in the NOFO:

- **Priority Area 1:** Cook, DuPage, Kane, Lake, McHenry, and Will counties, Oswego Township in Kendall County, and Aux Sable and Goose Lake townships in Grundy County.
- **Priority Area 2:** Madison, Monroe, and St. Clair counties.
- **Priority Area 3:** Champaign, DeKalb, LaSalle, McLean, Peoria, Sangamon, and Winnebago counties.

**Contiguous counties:** Boone, Cook, DeKalb, Fulton\*, Hancock\*, Henderson, Henry, Kane, Knox\*, Lake, Rock Island, Schuyler\* and Warren\*. Primary and contiguous counties are eligible for the same assistance.

The following counties previously received drought disaster designation for the 2023 growing season: Adams, Calhoun, Cass, Fulton, Hancock, Jackson, Knox, Logan, Mason, McDonough, McLean, Menard, Monroe, Peoria, Perry, Pike, Randolph, Schuyler, St. Clair, Tazewell, Warren, Washington, Woodford and Union

A Secretarial natural disaster designation allows the USDA Farm Service Agency to provide emergency loans to producers recovering from natural disasters. This assistance includes FSA emergency loans. Farmers in eligible counties have eight months from the date of the Secretarial disaster declaration to apply for emergency loans. Those eligible should contact their local [USDA Service Center](#) to ask questions or file a Notice of Loss.
